Q 'Social License' v Gov Decisions?

AUKUS Nuclear Submarines (N-Subs)

N-Subs are Nuclear Reactors:

- come with Nuclear Accident Risks
- require Health & Safety Impact Studies
 - require Emergency Response Plans
- Port Adelaide is Targeted for N-Sub Risks
 - Community have a 'Right to Know'
- Workers face serious Health and Safety issues
 - expect Socio-Economic Impacts

Q What does an N-Sub Nuclear Accident look like?

- comparable to a Nuclear Power Reactor Accident
- are 'Response Zones' set around an accident site
 - a "Precautionary Action Zone" of 600 m radius
- an "Urgent Protective Action Zone" of up to 2.8 km
 - Rescue, Decontamination and Evacuation
 - an "Extended Distance Zone" of 'a few kms'
 - a Population Study Area of 5 to 15 km radius
 - a potential for "Catastrophic Conditions"

Workers face Health Risks at a Military N-Sub

Is a Public Health limit set for ionising radiation exposure at a max dose of 1 mSv per year (millisievert)

However, in an "Urgent Protective Action Zone" of up to 2.8 km radius, federal Emergency provisions apply:

Emergency workers, other workers and affected members of the public "may receive a dose of up to 50 mSv"

(that is 50 times the max allowed annual dose of 1 mSv in civilian life)

Workers may face "catastrophic conditions"

- Male Workers can be called on to "volunteer"
- Female workers need to be excluded from actions that may result in a dose exceeding 50 mSv
- Workers "may receive a dose of up to 500 mSv for life saving actions, and to prevent the development of catastrophic conditions".

(that is up to 500 times the max dose of 1 mSv in civilian life)

 "... under circumstances in which the expected benefits to others clearly outweigh the emergency worker's own health risks".

What are our Federal and SA Gov's rolling out?

- a Federal Law to declare Osborne a Designated Nuclear Zone
- a new military nuclear 'safety' regulator to oversee Osborne
- Federal Law to override SA Laws and impose Nuclear Wastes

SA Gov 'Terms of Reference' for an Osborne Project EIS:

- "assembly, testing and commissioning of nuclear propulsion systems"
- "temporary protected storage of waste, including low-level radioactive waste"
- AUKUS High Level Nuclear Wastes to be imposed on SA?
